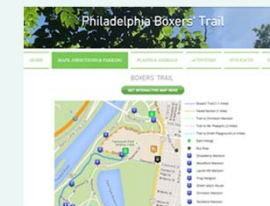

SUMMER PROJECT

- The goal was to promote the use of the Boxers' Trail, an underutilized trail in East Fairmount Park in the Strawberry Mansion neighborhood.
- First, a survey was created to determine what the barriers were to utilizing the Boxers' Trail
- Based on results, a website was generated with an interactive map. In addition, the website contained information on safety concerns, hiking difficulty, activities on the trail, and general questions
- A pamphlet was also created to guide hikers while on trail
